It was fun to see the oxygen foam escaping from the measuring cylinders. Lots of volunteers were required in order to make this a fair test.



Everyone needed to pour hydrogen peroxide solutions in at the same time and then all that was needed was to watch the chemical 'race'.

Year 5's Explosive Science Lesson




Year 5 had a very exciting Science lesson this month. They were testing what happened when they mixed two chemicals together, sodium bicarbonate and vinegar, which contains acetic acid.

Very carefully they poured a little vinegar into a plastic bottle and put some bicarbonate of soda into a rubber glove. They then stretched the glove over the top of the bottle so that the bicarbonate of soda fell into the vinegar.

The results were quite impressive! The pupils noted that the bubbling of the solution meant that a reaction was happening, then the glove started to blow up! This was because when the two chemicals react, one of the things that is made is carbon dioxide gas, which couldn't escape because it was trapped by the balloon. It was a great, interactive lesson.

Year 10 Investigate Chemical 'Cells'

Year 10 have been learning about energy changes in reactions. As part of this topic they set up and investigated their own chemical cells.



They set up their apparatus and used it to investigate the voltage produced by different metals. They were interested to discover that you can make a voltage with nothing more than salt solution and some different types of metals to be used as electrodes.




Art Trip to the National Portrait Gallery

The Science pupils were fascinated to find out which food contained the most sugar, starch, protein and fats.
