Museum of Childhood Trip

Year 1 had an enjoyable and interactive experience at the V&A Museum of Childhood on Friday 12 October. The pupils discovered first hand just how much there was to see and do, from exhibitions and displays to different activities. These included galloping on old fashioned rocking horses, performing a Punch and Judy show to others playing in the sand in a recreation of a Victorian beach, and dressing up as servants in Victorian costume and waiting on the Master and Mistress of the house by serving dinner to them.

Everyone participated in an interactive workshop, Toys on a Timeline, and discovered the toys our parents and grandparents and teachers played with when they were young! Some of the games were a challenge but all were good fun. This workshop introduced chronology to the children through a fun timeline activity showing how toys and playtime has changed over the last century.

Year 1 then explored the museum and looked closely at the displays, realising for themselves just how much toys have changed over the years. They investigated a range of indoor and outdoor activities from the past 150 years and began to plan and design a brand new toy, just in time for Christmas!

Languages Assembly

Year 5 Science

Year 5 were testing the tensile strength of different plastic bags in a recent Science experiment. They all made a prediction for which bag would be the strongest and which bag would be the weakest. Each pair were testing the strength of a different type of bag and then they shared the results with the rest of the class at the end of the experiment. They learnt lots of new vocabulary in this lesson including 'tensile', 'strength', 'independent variable', 'dependent variable' and 'fair test'. The lesson was very noisy with all the weights crashing down on the tables!



Year 6 Study the Art of Movement

Year 6 pupils have been working on 'capturing movement' in their art lessons. They drew and painted still figures initially, studying their own posture. After this stage, they moved onto moving figures where they moved their limbs and studied changing angles of arms and legs as well as body posture. Their figures were put into the context of WW2 where they drew moving soldiers and coloured them. Their work has been on display outside our Year 6 classroom during the last half term.





figures and sketched their own. Some pupils decided to sketch more than one figure to show differences in movement and posture. After sketching, they carefully cut out their figures, backing them on to card. They stuck their figures on a large paper and painted over them adding colourful backgrounds and they worked with different shades of colours to show blend and contrast.

Once they painted their background, everyone removed their figures from their paintings to reveal the outline and the results were amazing! They had a lot of fun working on their art project and their amazing art work will be on display outside our Year 6 classroom!



World War II Evacuee Visit

In the week before the half term break, Year 6 welcomed a very special visitor to the school. Mr Brencher was a child evacuee during World War II, and came in to talk to the pupils about his childhood experiences and memories of the war. Here, three Year 6 pupils recount the visit.

"On Tuesday 16 October Mr Brencher came in to our classroom and told us about WW2; however, he ran a little bit late so he came just before lunchtime. I went to help at lunch as a prefect but when we came back, he told us a story about his childhood during the war. He



told us that he had to stay with another family until the war was over. When the war ended he went back home but his dad would not let him to write to that family anymore.

Then he gave 4 of us letters to read. They were letters from children back then. One of them said on the train station someone wet himself because there were no toilets. The letters also told how children missed their families. They were difficult to read because the children did not spell things correctly.

Mr Brencher brought evacuee clothes with him and before he left, he gave them to us to try on. We took some pictures in them. The clothes were really weird but it was really fun." Isabelle

"On Tuesday 16 October, Year 6 had a visitor. His name was Mr Brencher. Sadly, he was late so Mr Dograr asked him to stay for lunch. Before long, it was the end of lunch and we came back.

After a while of settling down, Mr Brencher started telling us his life story. He was only 3 years old when he was evacuated. While telling his story he gave us some evacuee letters. He said that after the war, when his dad came to pick him up from his foster family, he didn't recognise his own father." Sophie

"On Tuesday 16 October, Year 6 had a visitor who had experienced being an evacuee. His name was Mr Brencher. Unfortunately, the transport was very slow so he only arrived just before lunch. Later on, after lunchtime, we all came back and he began his story...



He told us about his journey on the train and something that would be very unappealing to commuters these days, almost everyone wet themselves! He also shared with us some evacuee postcards, posters, leaflets and letters. Soon after that, we dressed up as iconic evacuee children with the clothes he brought with him. I wore the girls clothes and I promise you that I would not wear such clothes on a daily basis!" Ella

Year 9 Trip to City of London Police Museum

Handling historical police artefacts proved to be the most popular aspect of the Year 9 trip to the City of London Police Museum. Lucy (9T) found the heavy two-way telephone radio used by police motor cyclists particularly interesting. Pupils also handled a rattle previously used to attract attention and a fraudulent £5 note from 1982. Tackling fraud, surveillance, hacking, terrorism and cyber-crime have become the main workload for the City of London Police since 1973. This is because, although the area covered is just one square mile, it is the base for many banks and insurance companies and is flooded by nearly 500,000 people who arrive there every day for work.

Year 9 learned that the City of London police was founded in 1839, just one year before the Metropolitan Police. Before that, crime was handled by various assorted groups such as the Bow Street Runners, Watchmen and Aldermen.

Other historic artefacts examined by Year 9 included jars of bullet fragments from 1910 taken from the scenes of the Houndsditch murders and siege of Sydney Street. They also read about one of Jack the Ripper's victims called Catherine Eddowes, and saw an incendiary device from the 1940s which was dropped by the Germans on London during the Blitz. Additionally they also saw a City Police box board from the 1960s used by Police Control to communicate with call boxes. Displayed next to it was a blue police telephone box free for use by the public at the time.

The topic of fraud was explored more fully during a workshop, and Hamza (9K) revealed that he had spotted in the Museum forged coins plus a 'gold' bar which turned out to be made of lead. They also learned that every day there is at least one incident of credit card fraud in the City and saw how criminals use hidden cameras to clone the numbers on cards and then make the card disappear. Particularly fascinating was the GT200, sold as a multi-purpose detector of different materials including metal and human bones. People paid up to £22,000 for this device which was finally exposed as a fake in 2007, with the perpetrator sent to jail for seven years.

The class also studied fake emails, with Alexa from 9K spotting that one giveaway was that the email from Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs only gave people one day to complete and return all the information

required. The fraud workshop finished with a 'Super Recogniser' quiz, where pupils were shown a montage of forty faces devised by a Greenwich psychologist which on closer inspection turned out to be only two people!

Before lunch pupils briefly discussed careers, with a few pupils indicating that joining the police could be of interest. For this career choice, pupils will need to be thinking of going to university, as Howard, our guide, explained that after next year a relevant degree will be required, for example in forensics.

It was a thought provoking school trip, leaving everyone ready for lunch which was devoured outside in the nearby gardens.











House Music Competition 2018

Connaught House scooped the trophies in all three categories during our ninth annual House Music Competition, emerging as the clear overall winner. Our thrilling musical performers wowed the judges, with Guest Judge Michael Goodlet describing many of our talented young musicians as 'outstanding'.

Many parents watched on as our musical extravaganza kicked off with Connaught performing for the first category of Duet, with Lucy J playing the violin and Olivia L singing 'Caledonia'. Michael said this was a good song choice and sung with conviction by Olivia, who also engaged with her performance. Our Connaught performers were followed by vocalists Alexa and Beth singing 'I've Been Waiting For You' for Warren. They were described as 'outstanding' by Michael, who also praised their exceptional harmonies and high notes which were sung "competently and with emotion".

Moving onto the second category of Ensemble Performance, we were thrilled to hear Warren perform 'Wings' featuring vocalists Beth and Alexa again. Michael said the cohesive band was driven by Hannah M on the drums, with Beth again demonstrating her natural pitching with real power behind the notes. Other performers included Kalvin on the guitar, and Ilayda on the piano. However, the brilliant performance was pipped at the post again by Connaught performing 'Master Blaster' by Stevie Wonder. Michael said the instruments were used to their full potential and driven by Miles on bass guitar, resulting in a competent and funky musical arrangement between the instruments and vocalists. Other performers included Lucy J on the cornet, Hannah J on the drums, Imogen B on the flute and Jasmine playing the clarinet. The vocalists were Gabrielle and Imogen H.

Our third category was the House Song, which as Headmistress Claire Osborn explained, is fully inclusive since it embodies all pupils from Year 1 to Year 11, excluding a few swimmers who were away at a competition. We were firstly entertained by Warren performing 'Linger', and enjoyed a powerful performance on the drums by Damon which Michael said drove the song. Our Guest Judge also said the cohesive band demonstrated good song choice, participation and solid vocals. However, once again Connaught scooped the victory trophy in the most closely fought of all three categories. Michael singled out Veer on the drums, which gave the song a "unique flavour and solid rhythmic basis to the track". This was a crowd-pleaser with the dancers at the front from Years 1 and 2 adding an impressive energy and life to the performance.

After the winners were announced, Connaught House Captains, Miles and Eden, proudly collected four trophies, including an extra one for overall winner to round off a splendid start to an otherwise wet and gloomy Monday morning. We will now have to wait until next year to see whether Warren can fight back to reclaim some of the trophies!

The Charity Committee took the decision to donate the leftover cakes to The Spinney Care Home. Mrs Huxford and Mrs Houssain escorted Charity Committee representatives Alexa and Hamza (9K) to The Spinney. Year 10 GCSE Drama Trip

At the end of September the Year 10 Drama GCSE pupils of Normanhurst and Braeside Schools went to see Robert Alan Evans' new play, 'The Woods'. The play was a dark, absurdist piece, and explored motherhood and mental health. It was well reviewed, and Year 10 all spent a good deal of time debating the meaning of the play on the way home!

The play was held in the historic Royal Court Theatre, and the pupils got to experience new writing at a professional level.





Year 9 Science Practicals

Year 9, who have started their GCSE curriculum, have been carrying out their first required practicals this term. Required practicals have been placed into the syllabus to replace controlled assessments, and pupils need to be prepared for these in their GCSE exams.

The first practical is Microscopy; pupils have to learn how to set up microscope slides and ensure they know how to use a microscope in order to calculate magnification.

Pupils in Year 9 have also investigated the effects of diffusion in Science this term. They added water to Skittles and watched how the colours diffused through the petri dish. They also investigated how the temperature of the water affected the rate of diffusion.

Everyone enjoyed the hands-on approach to learning in these practical lessons.



Year 7 PE Trip

On Tuesday 2 October the PE department took all of Year 7 to the Lee Valley Hockey and Tennis Centre in the Olympic Park to see Great Britain vs Belgium in a hockey match. The match was commemorating Team GB's Gold in Seoul in 1988.

Pupils were excited to see some elite level hockey and were not disappointed. In a tight game, which Belgium won 3-2, pupils were amazed by the skills of the players on show. After the game they also got to see a hockey penalty shootout, which ran very differently to how they thought it would play out!



Outside of the match there were a number of stations and activities which pupils (and staff!) could take part in, including mini matches, a hockey style coconut shy and wall hockey. After this, pupils took a wander to the Velodrome where they had the chance to see some elite level athletes training on the indoor track. All pupils had a great day out and were a credit to the school!




"The French trip was a trip of 4 days (3 nights). Personally I believe that



Normanhurst Sports Report continued


