

Braeside Pupils Step Back in Time



Pupils at both the Junior and Senior sites at Braeside took part in many exciting History-related activities last term.

The term started with dinosaurs invading the Year 3 classroom as the girls brought in their impressive summer projects. Year 4 became

archaeologists, looking carefully at various artefacts to work out who an Ancient Egyptian Pyramid may have belonged to. Year 5 started as Ancient Greek potters in one workshop, before travelling back in time to Ancient Rome in an interactive session run by the Epping Forest District Museum.

Pupils in Years 6, 7, and 8 went on a trip to Bletchley Park, the home of the Enigma machine and Codebreakers. They were able to experience the life and work of these amazing people and spent time together trying to break some codes of their own.

Pupils in Year 9 have been exploring the background of World War 1. As part of their homework they created some authentic-looking recruitment posters and visited the local war memorial in the grounds of St John's Church to look at the wider impact of the war on the Buckhurst Hill community.

Our Year 9 and 10 Historians visited the Imperial War Museum at the end of November where they made a documentary that showed the many aspects of war.

of our solar system, and they went way beyond everyone's expectations. The children used a range of materials including polystyrene, paint, playdough, wire, felt tips, fabric, cardboard, string, stickers, glitter and even flashing lights.

GCSE Celebrations



Once again, pupils at both Braeside and Normanhurst School celebrated an excellent set of GCSE results over the summer.

At Normanhurst, 87% of grades achieved were at grade 4 or above,

with a quarter at grades 7-9. The pupils achieved particularly well in English and the creative and performing arts with 100% passes in English, Drama, Art, Graphic Design and Music. This included a number of grade 9 awards, as well as 100% passes in the triple sciences, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and French.

At Braeside, 95% of grades achieved were at grade 4 or above, with 47% of grades at grades 7-9. Once again the pupils achieved particularly well in Sciences and Maths with 100% passes in Maths and Biology, Chemistry and

Physics. Other subjects with 100% passes include Art, Drama, History and RS.

There were some excellent individual performances at both schools with a large number of pupils achieving a collection of excellent grades.



Positions of Responsibility

With the new school year comes new positions of responsibility. Every year, pupils have the opportunity to volunteer to become more involved in the life of the school, either by becoming a member of a School Council, Charity Committee, Green Team, Prefect Team or Head Boy and Girl. In many cases, in order to be chosen for these roles, the children have to showcase why they believe they will do well in the position, either by interview or presentation.

This year there were many worthy pupils all hoping to be chosen. At Normanhurst the Mayoress of Waltham forest visited the school to announce the School Council elections for Reception to Year 11. Candidates had to give a presentation to their form group outlining how they would fulfil their role on the School Council.

The Juniors at Braeside held elections for positions in the School Council, Green Team and Prefect Team, while



Senior pupils elected their Form Representative and Charity Representative from a large selection of candidates.

Both Oaklands and Coopersale Hall pupils had the opportunity to become Head Boy or Head Girl in Year 6, with other responsibilities also available such as House Captains, Sports Captains, Prefects, School Council or Food Council Representatives, Librarians and more.

These opportunities help the children to develop their confidence and nurture their leadership.
