'Clever Never Goes'

On Monday 13 May, Year 3 were visited by PC Karen to learn about 'Clever Never Goes'.

The 'Clever Never Goes' programme has been developed to replace the out-dated 'stranger danger' approach. Research shows that teaching children simply to avoid strangers fails to keep them safe. Strangers are often more likely to help a child than to harm them. Conversely, it can often be people known to children that pose the greatest threat. 'Clever Never Goes' moves the focus away from strangers and instead teaches children to recognise when someone (whether they are known to the child or not) is trying to persuade them to go with them.



The children had a great time with PC Karen, learning about how to spot if a stranger is helpful or not and even had the chance to try on PC Karen's uniform!

Junior Dragons Den

Years 3 and 4 recently took part in a 'Dragons Den' style mission where, with a partner, they designed their own chocolate bar and an advert to persuade the 'dragons' that their chocolate was the most creative and tasty chocolate bar. They spent time learning about different persuasive techniques, including using sophisticated language such as 'tantalising' and 'astounding', as well as using rhetorical questions. Once they had planned their advert, the partners pitched their idea to the four 'dragons', who were Ms Barnard, Mrs Demetriou, Mrs Beeson and Mr Grant. They all presented their chocolate bars very confidently and the four 'dragons' were very impressed with the variety of creative ideas!





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Kidzania Trip

“On 28 March 2019, Year 3 to Year 6 went to Kidzania. Kidzania is a place where children can do jobs that they might do when they are grown-ups. The reason we went there is because PSHE stands for personal, social and health education and we had to make personal choices and have educational fun.

Year 6 Science Experiments

In Science, the pupils in Year 6 have carried out experiments which they had planned themselves. They were given the choice of what to test as long as it was about their 'Electricity' topic.

Since Year 6 had already done series and parallel circuits in class, they were really confident with their basic knowledge. They wanted to be adventurous and experiment with different materials such as fruits and vegetables to see whether they could power a bulb by themselves or conduct any electricity. Some of the children simply wanted to see how many batteries it would take to blow a bulb!

There was a good range of questions that children came up with:

Alfie: How many batteries does it take to blow a bulb?

Kian: What are the perfect vegetables to use in a circuit?

Margarida: What other metals conduct the electricity as well as the wires we use in class?

Ismail: How many bulbs can a battery light?

Children then came up with their hypotheses and tested their ideas in class. They used voltmeters, bulbs, batteries, different materials and a variety of wires. Their findings varied:


Having measured the current with a voltmeter, Margarida found out that a metal paperclip conducted electricity the best. Second was a pair of scissors followed by foil.

Alfie found out that 7 was the maximum number of batteries that a bulb could handle!

Kian found out that, after measuring the current with a voltmeter, all the vegetables that he used conducted a certain amount of electricity. However, the best one was a lemon.

Ismail found out that a battery could light up a maximum of 4 bulbs.

Year 6 had a lot of fun and further questioned their findings by making suggestions to improve their experiments.

Year 10 Graphics Trip to the Museum of Brands Year 10 Graphic Communications pupils visited the Museum of Brands to explore the evolution of packaging throughout time. They made a selection of drawings in the museum's 'time tunnel' which has packaging from the Victorian era to the present day. The pupils participated in a workshop where they analysed a brand identity and imagined what the next evolutionary stage might be for the products. The trip was the starting point for their GCSE project to design packaging for a new fragrance.

Norman Hurst Sports Report

ISA Football Nationals Every player who represented the Norman Hurst under 11's team this year exceeded expectations and their attitude was superb. The boys that left St George's Park should feel proud that they represented the school in such an honourable way.

On Friday 3 May Norman Hurst School participated in the ISA National Football Tournament finals after winning their regional competition. It took place in the astonishing facilities of St George's Park in Burton-upon-Trent. St George's Park is the training and preparation ground for the England national football team and the complex cost around £100m.



The ISA national finals is one of the main goals for every independent school's football teams to be a part of and only 24 get through to this amazing tournament. The tournament hosted teams from different parts of England (Cambridge, London, Birmingham, etc.) and the teams were split in four groups of six. Norman Hurst found the group stages no problem coming top of group D with 3 wins, 1 draw and 1 loss. We played the first game against Thorpe Hall and drew 0-0. The second game was against Queen Ethelburgh's and we lost it due to a speculative long range shot, which ended up in the net.

Despite this loss we did not give up and we faced the third game against Duke of Kent with optimism. This was a special game because Duke of Kent were last year's runners up of the Tournament. It was a tied game and we managed to score the victory goal in the last few minutes. After some chances one of our players was in the right place at the right time and scored the goal that gave us the three points.



Then we then went on to win the fourth game comfortably against Alleyn Court School and with just one game left against Old Vicarage we decided to risk and to play with just one defender and a stronger midfield and attack. We played very well and finally scored the goal that gave us the victory. We had to wait in front of the table for the rest of the results and they went our way, we finished top with 10 points. Unfortunately, tired bodies from the group stages meant Norman Hurst were not as clinical with their chances in the later stages in the tournament but still played some of the best football on the day as said by both officials and other coaches. One draw and one loss against two teams meant we did not progress any further.

However, it is fair to say that 8 goals scored in 5 games whilst only conceding 1 goal throughout the group stages shows that we have grown as a team during the last few months. We finished 6th overall out of over 120 schools that entered the competition. Every single member of the team exceeded expectations and their attitude was superb. So we finally left St George's Park with our heads held high and the satisfaction that comes after a unique experience as a team.

ISA Regional Athletics This year the ISA Regional Athletics meeting in Bedford took place on a beautiful cloudless day. A very rare treat for this event!

The London North Athletics meeting is our regional qualifier for the National event held at the prestigious Alexandra Stadium in Birmingham later in June. If pupils win their event at the Regionals they qualify to be part of the London North team. So there is a lot to strive for...

This was another very successful day for pupils from Normanhurst School. We started the day with the toughest of races, the 1500m, and there was an excellent performance from Lucy (Y8). Our next success came from Paige who stepped up an age group to compete in the Y10/11 hurdles and won gold. More hurdling success came from Isabella who won gold in the Y8/9 race, and from Alicia in the Y8/9 100m. Then a flurry of success in the field events came our way with wins for Arsene (Y10) in the shot put, and Jay (Y10) with wins in the triple jump and high jump.

We also need to celebrate those pupils who did not manage to win but either came a very close second or gave a personal best performance, and there were plenty of those all day long, including Hamza and Kelaiah in their high jumps, Reuben with a PB in the 100m, and Nneka who came 2nd in the discus with a PB.

The junior team performed admirably all day giving their best in every event. Five out of the six junior relay teams performed well enough in the heats to run in the finals, an impressive achievement in itself and a testament to the quality of our junior athletes.

The day ended with the entertaining senior relays. The Year 8/9 girls once again stole the show with a faultless performance taking Gold and qualifying for Nationals. Well done Chelsea, Paige, Isabella and Alicia. There were also strong performances from the 8/9 boys' team and the Y10 girls finished the day in style!

I would like to thank Mr Clair and Miss Stone for travelling with the PE team, cheering, supporting and helping all day.

Tennis The summer term brings the tennis season and we have had a busy start, although unfortunately some matches have been disrupted by bad weather. However lots of matches have been played against Bancroft's, Forest, Brentwood, New Hall and St Paul's Way, with more due to be played or rescheduled against Roding Valley, Davenant and Clapton Girls Academy.

Normanhurst are playing in the English Schools Tennis Competition in both boys and girls Y7/8 and Y9/10 age groups. After all the matches Normanhurst will know if they have progressed to the next stage of the competition.

Year 5 Tennis Ridgeway Park Year 5 were invited to attend a special morning of coaching at Ridgeway Park in a scheme funded by the LTA to promote tennis in primary schools. Tom, the Waltham Forest tennis co-ordinator, took an exciting and challenging session, hopefully inspiring our pupils to play a little more tennis!
