### Interactive Lessons **Coopersale Hall School**

They have also been working with tangram square puzzles in Maths as part of their problem solving tasks.

lessons. In pairs, they drew a plan of the playground and estimated the distance across the length, width and around the perimeter. They then used trundle wheels to check the accuracy of their estimations.

Year 3 enjoyed taking part in Philosophy for Children discussions during their PSHE lessons. They had a particularly interesting debate about what they need to be happy. Everyone agreed that family, friends and love are vital for happiness - above electronics and television!

Both Reception classes have been busy with different cooking activities and they have also been trying some new foods. The children learnt how to follow a recipe and worked in a team to mix the ingredients together.
