The children at Oaklands have been learning about the role of guide dogs in the community and how they support people who have sight loss. They particularly enjoyed meeting Duffy, who is a puppy being trained to become a guide dog. They were impressed with how well-behaved he was throughout the entire assembly. The pupils learnt about how guide dogs could be trained navigate a range of different obstacles, access public transport, navigate town centres and help people who are visually impaired to live their lives safely.



Coopersale Hall Tree Planting

Led by Amelia, Head of the Eco Council, the members of the Eco Council, School Council and Year 6 helped with the planting of trees donated by The Woodland Trust.

The Queen's Green Canopy will create a network of individual trees, avenues, copses and whole woodlands in honour of The Queen's remarkable service over so many years. This will create a green legacy, with every tree planted bringing benefits for people, wildlife and the climate now and for the future.

The children chose a tree sapling to be named after them and were given the responsibility to plant and nurture it. They will continue to look after their trees periodically throughout the year.



The children visited the D-Day exhibition, watching a short movie that explained how the landings changed the course of the war and about the USA's involvement. They were even able to handle some of the replica items, outfits and weapons that were used during the war.

It was then time for a visit to the Museum of Passchendaele. museum is housed in the historic castle of Zonnebeke and focuses on the physical aspects of World War I.

Despite being a very long day, the pupils enjoyed the trip and expanded their history knowledge.

All of the staff were impressed with how engaged the children were during the trip and how much they learnt from the experience.



Oak-Tree Goes Green

Today, there is more emphasis than ever on the importance of looking after our environment and 'Going Green', and pupils at the Oak-Tree Group have been working hard to ensure they do their bit.

Braeside has formed its own dedicated 'Green Team' who regularly meet to discuss how they could improve the environmental impact of the school. Many pupils are part of the Gardening Club and Forest Club, which are in charge of the upkeep of the school's plants and trees. They have recently been awarded a Level 1 and 2 Gardening Award from the RHS. Braeside is also the proud owner of the Eco Schools Bronze Award. awarded for the school's active ecocommittee for completing a school Environmental Review and producing an eco-action plan.

Headmistress of Braeside School, Chloe Moon, comments, "We are all aware of the need to make changes to protect our planet for generations to come, and many of our pupils have taken it upon themselves to run projects to help turn the school, and the world, into a better place."

Normanhurst has set itself the task of turning the school's front garden into a lush, green oasis. Site manager Mr Whyte has already made a start with some help from the pupils. Together, they planted thousands of bulbs and 200 bedding plants as part of the schools 'Big Plant Project'.

Pupils at Normanhurst have also taken part in 'Chingford Fashion Week'. The theme for the week was 'Saving our Planet' and saw every item of clothing created for the finale fashion show made purely out of recycled materials.



The Eco-council and School Council at Coopersale Hall School helped plant 30 wild cherry, rowan and silver birch saplings, which were donated by The Woodland Trust. Even the Deputy Mayor of Epping joined the pupils to lend a hand. The planting of these counted towards trees Queen Elizabeth II's Green Canopy, a tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee. This will create a network of individual trees. avenues, copses and woodlands in honour of Queen Elizabeth II's service and the legacy she built.

The Eco-Council has also been proactive in encouraging other members of the school via a 'Let's Go

Green Challenge'. The idea is that the pupils do as many eco-friendly activities as they can at home. So far, it is proving very successful, with pupils taking recycling seriously, planting in their garden, going a day with electricity and collecting fruit from their gardens.

Oaklands School is taking part in the 3PR parking scheme, which encourages walking to school and parking considerately to help the environment. Children are encouraged to walk to school if possible and earn tokens for their school Houses. The scheme is already proving to be very successful, with many children persuading their parents to consider the locality and environment when travelling to and from school.


