Both of these hands-on experiences are a brilliant way to build on pupils classroom learning and teach about the wider world.




School Council Visits the Houses of **Parliament**


Into the Woods Jr.

Oaklands School London Eye

Normanhurst School Hyde Park Learning Centre

Year 11 pupils visited the Hyde Park Learning Centre to participate in a Practical Investigation Day - which is run by The Royal Parks charity for Key Stage 4.

The group demonstrated great enthusiasm, fully engaging in all activities. They conducted plant surveys using quadrats and measured light levels, soil moisture, and compaction in the meadow adjacent to the Learning Centre.

In the afternoon, pupils investigated the invertebrate population of the Learning Centre pond. There was much excitement as they discovered a variety of species, including dragonfly nymphs, water boatmen, numerous fly larvae, and even mating toads, with their string-like spawn beginning to emerge in the pond.

Year 4 made a visit to Highams Park Food Hub for an insightful look at how they help the community.

Sharon, the manager, explained that individuals and families in need are referred to the hub by organisations such as the council or doctors. She detailed how the hub operates on Tuesdays and Thursdays, welcoming people in groups of five to ensure a sense of privacy and dignity. Visitors are also offered a jacket potato and a hot drink during their visit.

Sharon then guided the group through the process of food distribution, explaining that recipients are allocated a set amount of food. Further explaining the daily temperature checks conducted to maintain hygiene standards.

The Food Hub relies heavily on donations, and Sharon



expressed gratitude for the contributions received from Normanhurst, particularly at Christmas.
